Emily Duncan, S1




My name is Emily and I am an S1 at Inverurie Academy.

Finally but not least I spoke to Dr Webster The Head Of Science:


Dr Webster likes the new school because there is a lot of space and new materials. He teaches Chemistry and Science S1-2. Dr Webster's department runs with 3

We are a Rights Respecting School



When did Inverurie Academy start Rights Respecting?

I [Mr Campbell] joined in August 2017 and by that point we had already begun our journey to Bronze, so I would think that our journey probably started around about 2016.

What is UNICEF all about?

Unicef stands for United Nations Children's Emergency Relief Fund. Its aim is to focus and enhance the rights of young people and protect them from both dangerous situations and countries. Some young people flee to other countries to seek safety and UNICEF helps their human rights be protected across the globe.

Mr Campbell is a Modern Studies teacher at this school and also runs the Rights Respecting Club. I asked him a few questions about UNICEF and how this club fits in at Inverurie Academy.

Why did it start here in Inverurie Academy?

There was a lot of change at that point; we had a new head teacher, Mr Jones, and there was a desire to make sure that young people's voices were heard loudly and more actively around the Academy. What better way to do that then to join up with UNICEF and deliver a rights respecting school agenda?

Why do you think that the Rights Respecting Club is important?

It's very important because it's all about your human rights! You've

got these human rights so you should be able to talk about them and know what to do when they are broken. Our Rights Respecting group is also making sure that staff and students work together to make sure that our rights are achieved.

What is Rights Respecting working on now?

The club is working towards Silver status for Rights Respecting so now we are starting to make sure that all our staff and young people at Inverurie Academy are not only able to identify their human rights, but also act on them, and protect them.
